# GUIDANCE AND EXPLANATION FOR USING THE INSTRUMENTATION SEQUENCING NUMBERS CHART

### **PURPOSE**

The main reason for the existence of this chart is to provide us with a consistent system for numbering the various instrumental parts. These numbers are intended to be used as the second segment of the **file name** for electronic files of these parts, so a computer will automatically sort them into proper collation order.

Any other usage you can make of this numbering sequence is great. You're welcome to it.

## **CONSIDERATIONS**

The first consideration is that we wanted to make this numbering sequence useful for concert bands, for those producing individual instrument parts when writing new music or scanning old, public domain music into electronic files.

We have had suggestions that we expand this list to include strings (orchestral), vocal, and miscellaneous other lines, and that can be done. Please see *Expansion*, and *Additional Sections*, below.

Another big consideration was that we wanted to be able to print this list on ONE PAGE. As you can see, the list itself *does* fit on one page. To get it to fit, we had to make a few compromises, so the list is not as comprehensive as it could be.

However, it is expandable. You may and should modify the chart as needed for your project.

# **EXPANSION**

The list is intended to allow the parts to be sorted in normal collation order. If you need to add an instrument that is not on the list, please use one of the unused numbers – there are plenty of them. Just select a number that will put the part into the proper collation order

If you need a number *between* two already-used numbers, then add a suffix, either alphanumeric or decimal. It doesn't matter which, as long as it's easily understood, and puts the new instrument into the proper place in the order. For example, if you need to add a choir of recorders, they could be numbered 109a, 109b, etc., **or** 109.1, 109.2, etc.

## **ADDITIONAL SECTIONS**

If you need to add orchestral strings, please use the numbers 500-599. If you would like to add individual vocal parts, you can either put them into the Miscellaneous section, or use the numbers 700-799. It might be better for collation, though, if you used the numbers 050-099.
